### General Entry Blank Rules:

- Only one person per entry blank, use additional plain paper if necessary. **Entries must include mailing address, Phone Number, Date and if Premiums are Donated Back.**
- Animals must have registration numbers available if asked.
- **Child Class** Includes children under 9 years of age as of January 1<sup>st</sup>.
- **Junior Class** Include age as of January 1<sup>st</sup>. Must be under 18 years old. A junior cannot show in an adult class if there is a class available in junior.
- **Adult Class** Includes 18 years old and over.

## **Animal Show Entries:**

- Entry forms can be dropped off the day of show.

- If forms are mailed, they're to be received by Monday before the fair and sent to: 785 Pochassic Rd. Westfield, MA 01085
- Animal registration papers must be available upon request.
- Changes must be submitted in writing to the Dept. Superintendent before entering the ring. Deadline is an hour before class starts.
- Use the base dates set up by Breed Associations when figuring the ages of your animals.
- Entries are limited to two (2) in single classes (except best udder which is one entry) and one (1) in group classes.
- Group entries must have been shown in single classes. Only one entry per class per breed

## **General Exhibit Information and Rules**

### **General Rules:**

- No person shall exhibit, be awarded or receive premiums in any department in which that person is a judge.
- Exhibitors and/or public are not to expect privileges or rebates on account of rain.
- Exhibitors and the public are not allowed to go barefoot.
- Lost and or found items will be located at the exhibit hall.

### **Exhibit Rules:**

- All exhibits must be produced, selected and arranged by the exhibitor. Livestock must be owned by the exhibitor at least 30 days prior to exhibition. An animal shown in a junior class cannot be shown in an adult class. Numbers will be checked at random by superintendents for age of animal, ownership, date of ownership & etc.
- Entries failing to comply with the premium list requirements will be disqualified. Livestock exhibitors failing to comply with dress code requirements will not be allowed in the ring.
- Placing will be awarded on a basis of quality of exhibits. The decision of the judges will be final. The Association and the judges reserve the right to reject any or all exhibits which are not listed in the premium book.
- Exhibitors cannot enter more than 1 entry in a class with the following exceptions:
  - Any other class - up to 3 different entries.
  - Cattle and Goats - 2 entries per class in singles
  - Sheep and Goats - 3 or more in singles, but only 2 premiums.

- Cattle and Sheep - Limited to 2 breeds per exhibitor.
- All animals shown in group classes must be shown in a single class.
- Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation or appearance, except external application of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protection the health of the animal is prohibited.

**Compliance/Damages/Loss:**

In no case shall The Littleville Fair Association or any of its officers be held responsible for any damages, loss, injury, death or disability by disease or from theft, or any other cause of such property, or to any person coming upon said Littleville Fair Grounds. The Littleville Fair Association hereby refuses to assume any responsibility for the safety as Bailee or otherwise of any property brought upon said fairgrounds. Said property being brought and kept upon said grounds at the owners own risk.

If the property owners or others interested in the property desire protection against loss, damage or injury from fire or any cause, they must make their own arrangement and pay for such insurance. The management will endeavor to use due care to protect all exhibits.

If it is ascertained that any exhibitor and/or exhibitor's employee has, in a disorderly and public manner, taken exception to judgement or ruling of an awarding committee, judge, superintendent, or any official of The Littleville Fair Association, The Board of Directors may exclude said offending exhibitor and/or employee from competing for a premium, or from exhibiting until such person shall have made proper apology and be reinstated by a vote of the majority of the entire Board of Directors

## Harriet Kelso Gilman

Mrs. Gilman passed away on January 9, 2026 she was 104 years old. She was the 6<sup>th</sup> Generation to be born on the Kelso Homestead Farm on Bromley Rd Chester, Mass to Leon Joseph Kelso and Elizabeth Miller Kelso. She graduated from Chester High in 1939 and was active in leadership in the 4-H Clubs and Local Fairs.

She attended the University of Massachusetts and Graduated in 1943, while there she met her husband of 72 years U.S. Army Col. (Ret) James Wilbur Gilman who preceded her in 2015. She traveled around the US with her husband before he left for war in 1944. As a military wife in 1946 Harriet got to attend post WWII Nuremberg, Germany. While her husband was an executive officer of the army battalion posted inside the Nuremburg Palace for the Nuremburg Trials.

In 1974 Harriet and family returned to the family Homestead to care for her widowed mother. There Harriet and her husband started remodeling the farmhouse and began building the blueberry farm. She also immersed herself in local affairs like serving as a deacon of the First Congregational Church of Chester, a member of the National and Chester Bicentennial Committees and as a Library Trustee.

In 2014 Harriet and Jim Moved to Armbrook Village where the two lived until their respective end of days.

# Lemon Cake

## Ingredients for the cake:

2 1/2 Cups Flour

1 3/4 tsp. Baking Powder

1/2 tsp. Baking Soda

1/4 tsp. Salt

1/2 Cup Olive oil

1 3/4 cups Granulated Sugar

2 tsp. Vanilla Extract

1 Cup Buttermilk, room

2 Tbsp. Lemon Zest (2 lemons)

1/3 cup fresh lemon juice

(2 to 3 lemons)

## For Frosting:

1 cup salted butter, room temp.

4 oz. cream cheese, room temp.

1 Tbsp. lemon zest (1 lemon)

Decorate cake with white chocolate curls

5 1/2 cups confectioner's sugar

3 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice (1 lemon)

3 to 4 drops yellow food coloring

## Directions:

1) Preheat oven to 350 degrees

2) Whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt in a medium bowl.

3) Whisk together the butter, olive oil, and sugar in a large bowl until combined. Add the eggs and whisk for 1 to 2 minutes, until lightened in color. Add the vanilla, buttermilk, lemon zest, and juice, and whisk to combine. Add the flour mixture and whisk to combine.

4) Spray 2- 8" round cake pans with baking spray. Line pans with parchment paper. Divide the batter evenly between the prepared pans. Tap pans to remove air bubbles from within the batter.

5) Bake for 28-32 minutes or until toothpick inserted into the center comes out with only a few crumbs. Transfer to a cooling rack. Let cool in the pans for 10 minutes, then turn out onto a cooling rack to cool completely, about 1 1/2 hours.

6) For the frosting. Add the butter, cream cheese, and lemon zest to the bowl and beat on medium speed until creamy, about 2 minutes. Add the powdered sugar. Beat on low speed until combined. Increase the speed to medium and beat until smooth, about 1 minute. Scrape down the sides and bottom of the bowl. Add the lemon juice and yellow food coloring. Beat until light and smooth, about 2 more minutes.

7) To assemble: Place 1 cake layer on a cake plate. Spread buttercream over top. Top with the second cake layer and spread buttercream all over the top and sides of the cake.

8) Garnish with the white chocolate curls.

Decorate cake with white chocolate curls

5 1/2 cups confectioner's sugar

3 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice (1 lemon)

## Directions:

1) Preheat oven to 350 degrees

2) Whisk together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt in a medium bowl.

3) Whisk together the butter, olive oil, and sugar in a large bowl until combined. Add the eggs and whisk for 1 to 2 minutes, until lightened in color. Add the vanilla, buttermilk, lemon zest, and juice, and whisk to combine. Add the flour mixture and whisk to combine.

4) Spray 2- 8" round cake pans with baking spray. Line pans with parchment paper. Divide the batter evenly between the prepared pans. Tap pans to remove air bubbles from within the batter.

5) Bake for 28-32 minutes or until toothpick inserted into the center comes out with only a few crumbs. Transfer to a cooling rack. Let cool in the pans for 10 minutes, then turn out onto a cooling rack to cool completely, about 1 1/2 hours.

6) For the frosting. Add the butter, cream cheese, and lemon zest to the bowl and beat on medium speed until creamy, about 2 minutes. Add the powdered sugar. Beat on low speed until combined. Increase the speed to medium and beat until smooth, about 1 minute. Scrape down the sides and bottom of the bowl. Add the lemon juice and yellow food coloring. Beat until light and smooth, about 2 more minutes.

7) To assemble: Place 1 cake layer on a cake plate. Spread buttercream over top. Top with the second cake layer and spread buttercream all over the top and sides of the cake.

8) Garnish with the white chocolate curls.

### **HELMETS AND SEAT BELTS MUST BE USED BY ALL DRIVERS**

1. Entry fee of \$20.00 per vehicle per class. **All participants will pay gate admission.**
2. Operators must be over 16 1/2 years of age and must have parents written permission if under 18 years of age.
3. Any situations that may arise and is not covered by the rules will be left to the discretion of the judges.
4. **ALL DECISIONS OF THE JUDGES WILL BE FINAL.**
5. Loading of drag will be under the direction of the judges.
6. **NO USE OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES WILL BE ALLOWED.**
7. Each contestant will provide one and only one hitch man to hook drag chain to truck.
8. No one will be allowed on the track except track officials and contestants. Track is defined as an area within 25 feet in any direction of the contest course boundaries. Any one in violation will result in disqualification of the contest.
9. Operator must remain seated during the pull.
10. Each vehicle may be entered in more than one class.
11. Vehicles will be weighed before each class starts and re-weighed after the class is over to qualify for premiums.
12. All vehicles pulling in a class must remain in the pit area.
13. Vehicle and drag must remain inside the boundaries of the contest course during the pull or will be disqualified.
14. All pulls made during a contest will be measured.

15. Track not to exceed 75' in length, 20' in width and all boundaries shall be lined.
16. All pulls shall be operated with two flagmen. Number one will be responsible for readiness of the track, pulling boat and contest. Number two will be responsible for the balance of the course.
17. When entering a class, all contestants will draw for position.
18. Contest to be governed by judge or judges with all decisions final. Judges have the right to stop and disqualify any vehicle if it is not being operated in such a manner that would be considered safe.
19. Contestant will designate his hitch man, anyone else will not be allowed on the track for safety reasons.
20. Four-wheel drive vehicles may run without tailgate or rear door for safer hook point visibility.
21. On the final draw, the operator who pulls the drag the greatest distance will be the winner.
22. All pulls must start with a tight hitch and no jerking is permitted. Contestants will be allowed two consecutive attempts or three minutes.

#### **TRUCK RULES:**

1. Pickups must have a bed with a floor, cab with closed doors, hood and fenders.
2. No dual wheels. Maximum wheel base is 148".
3. No nitrous oxide systems allowed.
4. No propane injection.
5. No portion of the vehicle may interfere with the sled hitch or sled during the pull.
6. The use of torque converters, automatic shift, etc. will be permitted.
7. Excessive loss of liquid by a vehicle while in forward motion during the contest on the track will be cause for disqualification, unless due to internal breakage.
8. Hitches & Drawbars:
  - A. Drawbars must be rigid in all directions, and must be equipped with a bolted steel-hitching device not more than 1" thick and with at least a 3" diameter opening. Cross-sectional thickness must be 7/8" minimum. Pulling point may not be more than 5" from the back edge of the hitching device.
  - B. The draw bar shall be no higher than 20" off the ground and no nearer than 36" from the center of the rear axle.

C. Winches may not be used in any way. Hitching must be to a bolted clevis or to a secure device approved by the judges.

9. Tires:

A. D.O.T. approved tires only. Tires cannot be changed or inflated after weighing.

B. No Sand Paddle Tires, No Paddle Tires, No tractor or equipment tires.

C. No studs or chains.

D. Rubber tires only.

10. Vehicle weight (any solid type of concrete or steel) securely fastened and mounted no higher and no wider than the general profile of the vehicle.

11. Front end weight may not extend further than 60" from the center of the axle.

12. All weights must be safely secured to the vehicle.

13. Weight cannot be moved after the vehicle has been weighed except on the slab within a three-minute period. Only the hitch man and driver may move these weights.

14. Rear weights must be securely bolted and be solid weights.
